Will continue this year with community engagement activities, and business/residential checks.

 Fire and Rescue Report-Highlights by Tim Tomsich-mentioned Breitung rendered Mutual Aid in 14 instances with 0 Mutual Aid Received. No talk of any merging with other departments other than Eagles Nest approaching Breitung Township. Tim Tomsich spoke of informal conversation with the City of Tower and encouraging the City to work on issues with their department.

Tim Tomsich reviewed the levy reports and findings for the 2024 year. Suggested to increase the R&B levy by \$34,000. \$4000 for Insurance and Wages and \$30,000 for Road Maintenance and Snow Removal. Number of things are changing and increasing in price-most notably heating, fuel, employee insurance, water, sewer and road improvements. Tony Sikora mentioned that his tax assessment for the dump is \$85/per year vs \$15/per year for ambulance replacement-something is wrong.

Motion by Tony Sikora to approve tax levy of \$690,000 for 2024 as presented with the noted increase of \$34,000 from 2023 under Road and Bridge as presented 2^{nd} by Greg Dostert

• Embarrass Regional Fair Request for monetary donation as well as volunteers-Tana Johnson spoke of the work being done by the group, and how they are reaching out Regionally. Many positive comments from Soudan Citizens.

• Township Property on 4th Avenue-Discussion that the DNR will be creating an ATV trail from the State Park to connect to Tower. The Town Board approved option 1 of the DNR's plan for several reasons- (1) to increase the size of the gravel pit, and (2) to prevent a trail and numerous ATV riders down Japer St in Soudan. Wayne Kultala owns a triangle piece of property south of Hwy 169 that would benefit Breitung Township. The benefit is both the expansion of the gravel pit and to allow the DNR access to build a portion of their trail to connect to the Taconite Trail. Discussion with Wayne Kultala by Chuck Tekautz and Wayne would like to possibly trade the property identified with the in-town property that the Township owns (Parcel ID 270-0110-02780) Block 26, Lot 2 which is approximately 50' X 107" with an estimated value of \$4100. Tony Sikora expressed his extreme displeasure with this idea.

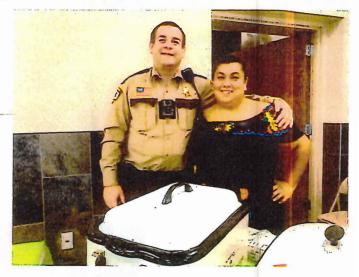


2nd Annual Tacos with Cops

Following are highlights of the past year:

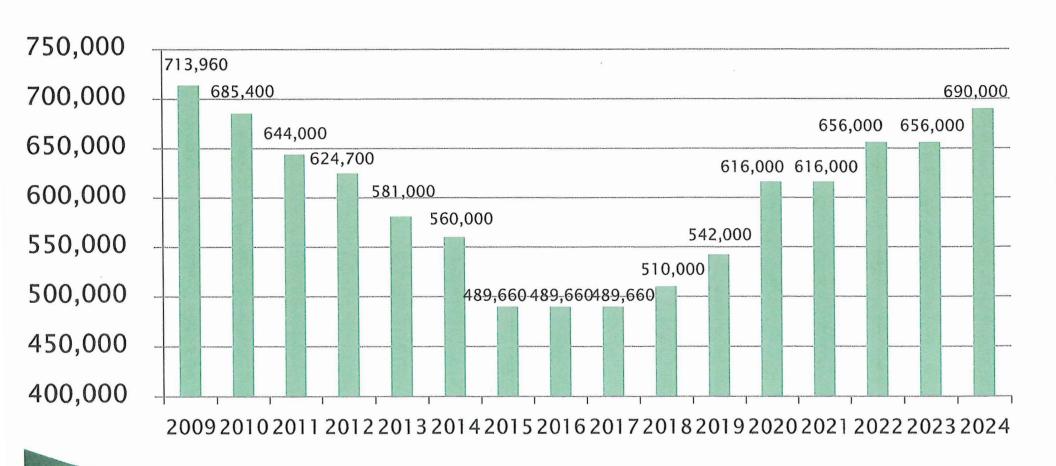
- The trail reconstruction is nearly completed which upgraded the existing trail from Soudan to McKinley Park. A DNR grant of \$150,000 and an IRRRB grant of \$202,500 were awarded for this work and funding from McKinley Park revenues.
- The work continues to our roads and sewer system which includes the blacktopping of the Spring Road, sewer work on Poplar Street and rebuilding a section on Church Street adjoining Highway 169. Funding for these improvements was approved by the IRRRB of \$200,00 and CDBG of \$90,000.
- The contract to reduce inflow into our sewer system was awarded that involves work on First Avenue and Church Street. Funding was approved by CDBG and the IRRRB.
- Future ambulance services and equipment replacement has occupied the advisory commission's time with Chuck and Matt providing experienced and knowledgeable representation for our township.
- The police contract with Tower was extended through 2024 with minor adjustments for coverage.
- A 3-year (2024 thru 2026) labor contract was agreed upon with the union representing our maintenance employees.
- Demolition work to replace the playground equipment at McKinley Park began with the new equipment scheduled for delivery this spring.
- The wastewater board's project for forcemain manhole repairs is complete and the PFA loan paperwork is onging.
- The contract for upgrades to the Stuntz Bay Road was awarded with construction set to start this year.
- Grant funding for improvements to the recreation area and additional water, sewer and road work are prepared and some are already under review by various funding agencies.

Thank you to the employees and volunteers for the work that you perform at high standards each day to provide the services that the citizens of the Township of Breitung expect.

Township of Breitung Road Improvement Project

Summary

This project is to improve our township owned road by reconstructing the existing road from the middle of our sand and gravel operation to the eastern edge of our property line. The benefits of this improvement are:

- Provide safer access from State Highway 169
- Eliminate the system deficiency in the present sand and gravel operation
- · Create a safe connection trail to the new State Park ATV campground
- Support economic development and congestion relief

The budgeted cost of this project is \$500,000 with the substantial completion date set at June 30, 2025.

Safe Access

The relocated entrance/exit of our road will provide for improved site lines, proper acceleration bypass lanes and elimination of the existing entrance which is located on a curve at the crest of a hill on HWY 169. The current road serves two separate sand and gravel operations: our own township and an active private construction firm and also private landowners further down the road. The activity of construction and gravel equipment leaving and entering the existing road is especially hazardous due to the curve and hill at Hwy 169. The majority of this work occurs during the same time of increased traffic due to seasonal travelers visiting the area only adding to the likelihood of conflict at the Hwy 169 entrance.

Present system deficiency

Our township's sand and gravel operation has developed to the point of reaching the boundary of the existing road which dissects our pit property. The current operations are limited to further development until the road is relocated. Additionally, the private operator is disadvantaged due to their equipment having to connect to the existing road on a curved entrance. Relocating our road will provide for proper pit development and allow for improved use of our sand and gravel resources over the next 50 years. The private operator will have a direct exit from their pit operations to the new road and both operations will be more productive with the new HWY 169 access point.

Safe connection to new State Park ATV campground

Our township is home to Minnesota's newest state park and as it is being developed out the need for a new campground for ATV vehicles was funded by the legislature and planning is currently underway by the DNR. They have approached us with the need to connect the trail from the campground to the access point further down our existing road. This relocated road will provide a safe and highly visible route for the ATV riders with minimal interaction of the sand and gravel operations. The route of the new road is the safest alternative and will reduce or eliminate the potential of traffic crashes, injuries and property damage. The campground is planned to be operational in 2025.

Support economic development and congestion relief

The popularity of the new Lake Vermilion Soudan Underground Mine State Park continues to grow each year and improving this road will raise the positive experience the visitors have while exploring our area. ATV use is on the rise and accommodating this economic pastime with a safe and enjoyable connection will support the local economy and direct ATV traffic to the designated trails and reduce the congestion of ATV's, vehicles and pedestrians on residential streets. Local residents will especially notice the improvement of living in the area with a safer MN Highway 169 entrance and exit as they go about their daily trips in local towns with minimal ATV traffic interference. Improvements in the sand and gravel operations and relocated road will result in efficiencies in providing necessary resources for further development in our area.

Breitung Township Road Improvements - Technical Design Report

The Breitung Township Road Improvements project will improve safety for vehicles and ATVs and address the Township's ability to continue to operate its sand and gravel pit. The DNR is currently developing a new campground and ATV trail at the Lake Vermilion Soudan Underground Mine State Park which are scheduled to open in 2025.

The road's current connection to Hwy 169 is located on a curve and a hill which limits line of sight and is especially hazardous due to the gravel haul trucks and the increased park traffic.

The project will construct a 1,200-foot section of the 24' wide paved from Thompson Farm Road to the intersection of Hwy 169 approximately 0.2 miles east of the current location. See attached map. The project will also add a right-hand turn lane from TH 169 onto the road as required by MnDOT. Stormwater management and grading plans will be prepared for the construction of the relocated road.

The estimated project cost is \$633,200.

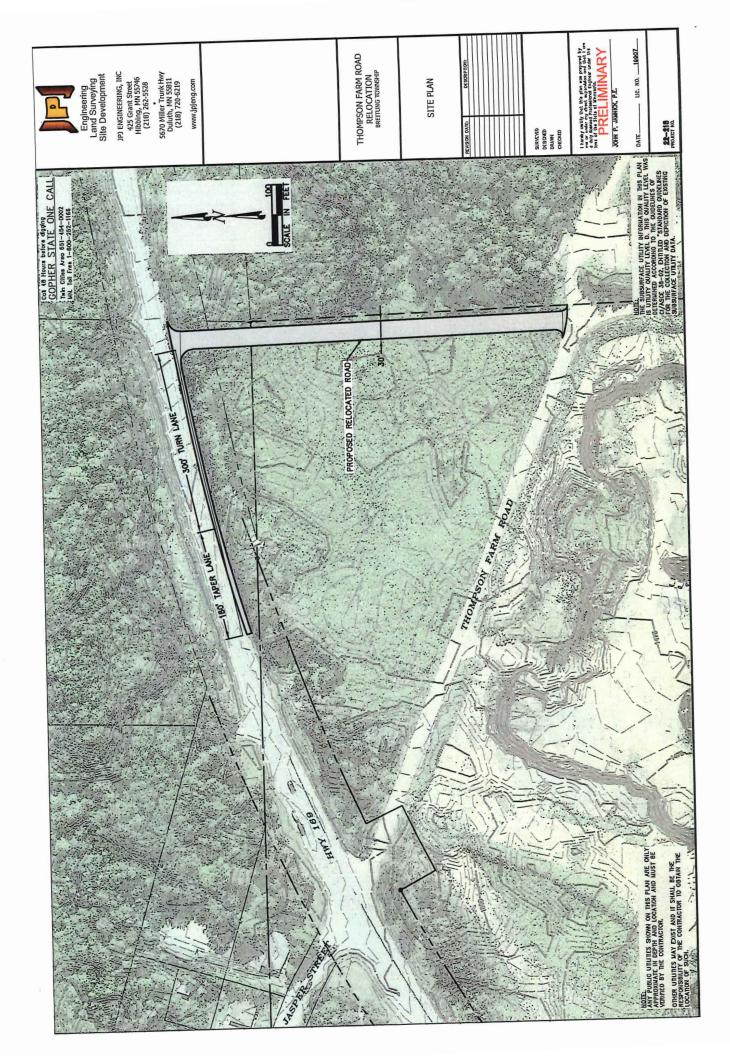

Dear Town Board,

We are writing to the Town Board to request a donation to the Tower-Soudan Historical Society. Your donation will be used to support the restoration of the Historic Tower Fire Hall at 504 Main Street. We ask for your support of \$500 in 2024.

We've made tremendous progress in 2023! With special grants from the Blandin Foundation, Northland Foundation and the Mortenson Family Foundation we were able to start restoring the interior masonry walls in preparation for the HVAC phase. The restoration completed all of the masonry walls but for the south masonry wall and door. In 2024 that door will be replaced when that wall is partially removed and restored with historic elements true to the building. This entrance will be able to accommodate the 1891 James Tippet fire engine, which will be the featured artifact in the fire hall.

Work on the handicap-accessible restrooms started and will be completed along with other interior finishes during 2024. The HVAC will be installed and the electrical system will be upgraded to meet code. Minnesota Historical Society is the primary funder, with a supporting grant through the Department of Iron Range Resources and Rehabilitation. Minnesota Historical Society noted in making their award that the support from the community was impressive. Breitung Township was a major contributor for the match.

We must continue to reach out to the community and ask for continued investment in the project. Our growing support is derived through pledges and annual donations from residents, seasonal visitors, local businesses and various fundraising events.

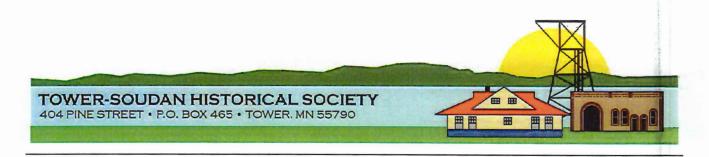
